EUROPEAN HISTORICAL THERMAL TOWNS ASSOCIATION - EHTTA

Created in 2009, the EHTTA is a network composed of 25 member spa towns situated in 11 European countries, including Evian in France, Baden Baden in Germany, Bath in the United Kingdom, Ourense in Spain, Acqui Terme and Montecatini Terme in Italy, the Karlovy Vary region in the Czech Republic, Budapest in Hungary and Bursa in Turkey.

The objectives of this European network consist of obtaining recognition of the innovative and cultural characteristics of the European spa towns from the European Union, with a view to developing their tourist activity in the framework of a new plan encouraging the cross-border tourism of "Destination Europe". EHTTA encourages the development and economic restructuring of thermal towns, and safeguarding their cultural heritage through the exchange of experiences and best practices on a European level.

Collectively, the member towns of EHTTA are an integral part of the Cultural Route of Historic Thermal Towns, recognised by the Council of Europe.

SOURCE PROJECT

The "Sources of Culture: the Cafés of Europe" initiative is a two-years project involving 11 partners from 6 different European countries. It is a multidisciplinary project based on the origins and the future of the "European spa-town culture", aiming to discover, trough to collaboration and coworking between cities, this shared European heritage that lays on spa tradition.

Debates organised in the framework of this project - the Cafés of Europe - will be gathered together and put into perspective in a "Thermal Blue Book", which will present contributions and scenarios for Europe in 2020 It will also encourage and improved the intercultural dialogue and exchange, through the creation of a permanent common platform from where to spread a notion of creative thermal culture in this cities.

OURENSE, CAPITAL TERMAL

For the City Council of Ourense the celebration of this second Café of Europe is an opportunity to discuss two mains questions in our identity as city: our thermal tradition and our position as pilgrimage center. The cults of deity Revve Anabareago first and the Way of Saint James later turned Ourense into a pilgrimage place where travellers come seeking our healing waters as well, a fact that contributed to preserve this thermal tradition through history. A clear connection arises here, the one established between waters, pilgrimages and spirituality, summarized in the concept of "Hospitality", the main axis of this Second Café of Europe and the essence of our history as city.segundo Café de Europa e característica principal da nosa historia como cidade.


